What is program evaluation?

Program evaluation is a systematic method for collecting, analyzing, and using information to answer questions about program implementation and effectiveness.



Types of program evaluation



Process evaluation examines how programs are delivered.

INCLUDES...

- Implementation evaluation
- Formative evaluation

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Outcome evaluation examines if and how program activities change participant outcomes.

INCLUDES...

- Experimental or impact evaluations
- Quasi-experimental designs
- Pre-post single group designs
- Cost-effectiveness and cost-benefit



Program evaluation framework

- Utilization-focused evaluations (UFEs) are judged on the degree to which they are useful for the end users. Planning starts with questions about who will use the data and how.
 The findings and process are used to improve program performance. UFE values participation from multiple users and includes process and outcome evaluation.

Getting started: Finding an evaluator


- Internal vs. External?
- Factors to consider?
- Where to look?
 - Contact Local universities or The American Evaluation Association
 - Reference evaluation reports (ACF website)
 - **Invite** proposals from specific evaluators
 - Advertise on your website and social media pages or on a partner's website/social media pages
- Evaluate proposals and decide.

Program evaluation planning

- Why is planning ahead so important?
- Avoiding the "Uh oh, what did I get myself into?"





Getting to know you: First date

- Background and experience—affects framework/priorities
- Creating shared language-- improves communication
- When and how to communicate helps ensure communications happen



Conversations from the field



- How did you find each other?
- What were you looking for in an evaluator vs. practitioner to partner with?
- What has worked well in prior partnerships?
- What has not worked well?

Possible deal breakers

- Your evaluation partner
 is unwilling to communicate regularly
- Your evaluation partner
 is prioritizing evaluation needs over participant well-being
- Your evaluation partner prefers working alone from the program team, stakeholders, or participants

- With this evaluation we hope to...
- And we will use the findings to...




Getting ready: Conversation starters

- Who are the intended users of this evaluation?
- What are the primary purposes of the evaluation?
- How will the data be used to inform programs or practices?

- Who should be involved in the evaluation?
- What do you want to learn through the evaluation?
- How can the evaluation help to build organizational capacity?



Conversations from the field




- What are the most important issues for evaluators and practitioners to discuss in the early stages?
- Evaluators and practitioners generally have different trainings and priorities in their work. What are some common tension points that may arise from these differing perspectives or priorities?

Identifying and engaging stakeholders

Conversation starters

- Who are the key stakeholders?
- What will they want to know?
- How will they be involved?
- How can we get buy-in?





Identifying and engaging stakeholders

Stakeholders	Level of Involvement	Reasons for involvement	How will they use the data?	When will they need the data?
Substance abuse treatment center	Core	Will be a bi-directional referral partner	Track additional services received beyond treatment center, decisions about service provision	Quarterly

Conversations from the field



- In your experiences, what stakeholders have been most important to involve?
- Do you have tips for getting buy-in from stakeholders to participate in or support the evaluation?
- What are the best ways to leverage stakeholders in an evaluation?

Possible deal breakers

- You are struggling with communicating the benefits of the evaluation to your stakeholders
- Your stakeholders are reluctant to fulfill their role or are not buying in to the evaluation
- You and your evaluation partner cannot agree on stakeholders' level of involvement



Prioritizing program evaluation goals

Things to consider...

- Importance Do your evaluation questions reflect what is most important to your organization, stakeholders, and funders?
- **Contribution** Will your evaluation questions help you develop knowledge that will contribute to your organization's service delivery and to the larger field of human services?
- Resources Do you have the necessary time, staff, and financial resources to actually carry out this plan?
- Support Will your organizational leaders, stakeholders, and funders support this plan?



Conversations from the field



A common issue in evaluation planning is asking too many evaluation questions. Do you have tips for narrowing down or prioritizing evaluation questions?

Possible deal breakers

- The evaluation will provide data you already have or answer questions you already know
- The evaluation will not result in data that can actually be applied to improve program activities.
- The evaluation will not provide data until Year 5 of your grant




Understanding how the program works

Aligning program services and goals with evaluation measures





Conversations from the field



- How have logic models or similar tools helped you align the program activities and flow with the evaluation?
- What happens when program logic models and evaluations are not aligned?
- If that happens, how can it be fixed?

Possible deal breakers

- The logic model does not reflect the theory of change (how the intervention will work to achieve program goals)
- The outcome measures do not reflect the goals
- The evaluation indicators
 do not align with program activities and flow
